Hand commentaries were given out after the tournaments which rounded off the experience nicely along with prizes (interesting bridge books and handy Andrew Robson flippers) for the winners.

Most players stayed over at the Holiday Inn Express and an evening meal was organised in the nearby Di Maggio's restaurant where players then truly got to meet and mingle and perhaps even talk on subjects other than bridge!

The following comment from a budding new bridge player may truly reflected the experience of many:

"As a lockdown online beginner who had never held cards, the St Andrew Club Meet and Play was an invaluable step in my bridge career. With the wilds of BBO as my benchmark and a sense of dread beating excitement at the prospect facing humans across the velvet battleground, it was scary to contemplate the transition to club play. Add in the distractions of strange table paraphernalia, procedures and scoring and the challenge was to quieten sighs of anguish. # The Highland (Aviemore) Congress

"Back to the Future?"

The first Aviemore Congress was run in 1973, so the 2023 Congress celebrated 50 successful years. The brainchild of Hamish Pringle, masterminded for so many years by Bill Richardson, Aviemore was the most popular Scottish Congress. Its successful run was interrupted in 2020 by Covid, the 2021 Congress was held online, and the 2022 edition was held in a less than ideal venue in Aviemore itself.



The 2023 Aviemore Congress returned to its traditional home in Coylumbridge. The hotel is the ideal Congress venue, with an enormous playing area and lots of space for socialising.

The hotel offered very competitive rates for dinner, bed and breakfast and threw in coffee and cakes to fill the void between the Bidding Competition and afternoon play. Dinner was served as a buffet, allowing lots of drinking time before and after. Staff were welcoming and helpful, and the management threw in some vouchers as extra prizes. The only complaint I heard was that the bar closed at 11pm!

Congress Managers, **Ann and Tim Wickens**, and Tournament Directors **Horst Kopleck** and **Matthew Robb** did a terrific job, with the attention to detail that has always been the essence of Aviemore.

# The Case for RealBridge

# Surely online providers like RealBridge are much fairer and better for national red pointed tournaments than F2F?

This issue reports on two very successful F2F events.

Mike Hammett makes the case for Online Bridge.



- 1) Members of the big city clubs in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Dundee, Stirling and the like are much more able to obtain red points than those who reside further away because they don't have to encounter such huge travel and/or hotel costs.
- 2) F2F is dauntingly much more difficult and off-putting for those players with mobility problems or vulnerable people fearful of travelling in the dark of winter.
- 3) F2F Inhibits players from further afield thereby excluding many potential rivals from competing in a level playing field.

Some of the reasons why RealBridge isn't as popular as it should be in comparison to both F2F and to other online providers:

- 1) Potential cheats dislike it because its openness makes it much more difficult to collude in comparison to more opaque providers.
- 2) It reduces the fun of not being able to get to a communal toilet in time.
- 3) The other players look far too comfortable wearing slippers etc.
- 4) It deprives participants of the ecstatic pleasures of travelling in the rain, ice, snow, fog, and dark.
- 5) It's cheaper, depriving taxi drivers of fares and garages of fill ups.
- 6) It considerably reduces the pleasures and challenge of often being disconnected.
- 7) It reduces the vagaries of the chat box, such as misspellings and the deletion of a lot of badly timed chat.

Hopefully very soon the failings of F2F bridge and of the dated and overburdened online providers will be a thing of the past and the smooth efficient relaxing providers such as RealBridge will become compulsory in national competitions in Scotland, as is already happening in other more responsive countries

My own personal results tend to be a lot better on RealBridge and Bridge Club Alive etc simply because it is much more relaxing not to have to face the adversities pertaining to their rivals.

The F2F excuse of online losing "in the flesh" contact doesn't hold up. If that really were really so, how does that measure up with the fact that TV and films are far more popular in comparison to live theatre, which is available rarely to big city dwellers in the main at either much greater cost and/or heavily subsidised?

Mike suggests a ZOOM meeting of the membership to discuss this issue. We think that would be rather unwieldy. But we would love to hear the opinions of our members on the F2F v RealBridge debate

#### 2) Forcing Bids


A Forcing Bid is one that demands a response; you may not Pass. Note that Forcing does not necessarily mean Strong! Limit bids are, by definition, non-forcing

# It's a Funny Old Game:

#### The Expert Lead



#### This deal cropped up in an SBU 'Play and Discuss' Session.

Two intrepid Wests chose to open 3♠ in the modern style.

North overcalled 4♥, East bid 4♠ and South closed the auction with 6♥.

At 8 of the other tables West opened a more normal weak 2♠. Most Norths overcalled 3♥.

What should East do?

NS are vulnerable and clearly have the values for game, if not slam.

Over a double there is a good case for raising to 4♠, even perhaps 5♠, making them guess a strain.

But once hearts are bid a random raise may simply provoke them into slam – or they may decide to take the money from 4♠ doubled, which is unlikely to be a cheap sacrifice.

The remaining Wests opened a Multi 2♦ and East took no part in the subsequent auction. Half the field bid slam, half did not.

At one table North overcalled 2♥, South bid 3♣. North bid 3♦ and South closed proceedings with 6NT.

What would you lead?

West saw no point in a spade lead and tried a diamond.

Declarer was not tested: she established hearts for 12 tricks.

But the Double Dummy Solver was quick to find the killing lead: the ♠K!

Pinning the singleton Queen leaves declarer with no chance.

Double dummy she can escape for -3 by taking a club finesse or two.

A more likely result is -5 after a losing heart finesse.

Leading the King from holdings like KJTxxx may pin a singleton Queen in any hand, (including partner's) and probably does not cost compared with a low card when the Queen is not singleton.

But a word of warning: at a long ago Lederer an expert led the ◆K from ◆KJT9xx against a 3NT contract. He pinned his partner's doubleton ◆AQ!

#### **Answers to Quiz**

1a) Limit raise, 10-12HCP;

b) Limit raise. 12-14HCP;

- c) Delayed limit 3-card raise 10-12 HCP
- d) Limit jump rebid, 15-17HCP;
- e) Unlimited change of suit, but not forcing after the 1-over1 response;
- f) Unlimited change of suit, forcing after the 2-over-1 response
- 2a) A new suit by responder is **forcing** (you may pass if partner has already passed in 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup> seat)
- b) A change of suit by opener after a 1-over-1 is not forcing but it is unlimited: try to find another bid
- c) A single raise of responder's suit is **limited** and therefore **not forcing**.
  - (Some partnerships treat this as Forcing. Discuss with partner!)
- d) A rebid in a higher-ranking suit at the 2-level (aka reverse) is forcing for one round
- e) A rebid in a lower-ranking suit after a 1-over-1 is **not forcing** but unlimited. Try to respond.
- f) A jump rebid after a 2-over-1 is forcing because the 10+HCP response means the partnership has game value
