

The aim of this lesson is to provide guide lines about assessing the strength of a hand using methods in addition to the HCP system.

The method first learnt is the HCP method but this has weaknesses – it undervalues Aces and Kings and over values Queens and Jacks. It does not make any attempt to assess the shape value of the hand.

Two other methods are discussed

- 1 Living in Sin high cards in Long suits, Intermediaries and Sequences
- Losing Trick Count Assume an opening hand bidding 1 of a suit has
 7 LTC. Add the LTC of the partnership hands and subtract from 18 =
 number of tricks that should be won in that suit.

Warnings to emphasise

- 1 Only use the LTC once a trump FIT has been found
- 2 The LTC is useful in unbalanced hands
- Only use LTC if your side opens the bidding it is not helpful after overcalls.

Rule of 20 – When deciding whether to open the bidding you can use the Rule of 20 – "Add HCP count to the total number of cards held in the two longest suits. If this is 20+ then you can open the bidding". This idea is helpful especially with very unbalanced hands.

Rule of 14 – Students are often told not to respond with a new suit at the 2 level unless they hold 10 + HCP. The Rule of 14 says "Add your HCP to the number of cards in your long suit. If that is 14 or more you can bid your suit at the 2 level"
