

## Lesson 8 Teacher's Notes

## Aims

- To emphasise the importance of a system
- To demonstrate how knowing the meaning of a bid allows us to make logical deductions

## Content

- 1 Emphasise the importance of *limiting* your hand: "Never lie about your strength" Demonstrate how easy it is to make deductions when you *know* partner's strength
- 2 **Balanced** and **unbalanced** hands A balanced hand is one of these shapes: 4-3-3-3, 4-4-3-2, 5-3-3-2. Any other shape is not "balanced" A *doubleton* (two cards in a suit) can exist in both balanced and unbalanced hands *Singletons* (one card in a suit) and *Voids* (no cards in a suit) always mean the hand is <u>unbalanced</u>
- 3 To open *INT* the hand must be both balanced *and* with the correct point count

4 Opening *one of a suit*. Revision of which suit to open and more detail
"We open our longest suit" with unequal length.
With two 5-card suits, (or two 6-card suits) we *always* open the higher-ranking suit (One exception, with ♣/♠ open a club to help bidding development)
With two 4-card suits we *normally* open the higher:

with 4-4 in  $\bigstar + \clubsuit$  we open 1  $\bigstar$ ; with 4-4 in  $\bigstar + \blacklozenge$  we open 1  $\bigstar$ with 4-4 in  $\blacktriangledown + \clubsuit$  we open 1  $\bigstar$ with 4-4 in  $\blacktriangledown + \clubsuit$  we open 1  $\blacktriangledown$ BUT: with 4-4 in <u>both majors</u> or <u>both minors</u> we open 1  $\blacktriangledown$ with 4-4 in  $\bigstar + \blacktriangledown$  we open 1  $\blacktriangledown$ 

with 4-4 in  $\blacklozenge$  +  $\clubsuit$  we open 1  $\clubsuit$ 

(With three 4-card suits, a 4-4-4-1 shape, there are special rules in brief, a 4-4-4-1 hand with both *black* suits opens 1.

a 4-4-4-1 hand with both *red* suits opens 1 •

with 4-4-4 in  $\bigstar + \heartsuit + \diamondsuit$  open 1  $\heartsuit$ 

- with 4-4-4 in  $\forall + \diamond + \clubsuit$  open 1  $\forall$
- with 4-4-4 in  $\bigstar + \blacklozenge + \clubsuit$  open 1  $\clubsuit$ 
  - with 4-4-4 in  $\bigstar + \checkmark + \bigstar$  open 1  $\bigstar$

There is no need to introduce this yet unless someone asks!)

5 **Responses** to an opening bid of 1 of a suit. (Revision from Lesson 7) With 6-9 points we have a minimum response.

We bid 2 of partner's suit with 4+-card trump support (<u>limit raise</u>) With 4 or more cards in a suit <u>we can bid at the 1-level</u> we bid that Otherwise we bid 1NT

Higher bids mean we have more than minimum points
