Lead $\diamond \mathrm{J}$ (top of a sequence)
The extra length makes North worth 1 a, and when partner raises he can add 5 distribution points, well worth game.

Lead $\bullet$ Q (top of a sequence)
West adds 2 points for the singleton and one for the extra trump, so he is worth a game bid.

Lead $\% 6$ (fourth highest from a long suit)
North has four extra distribution points. The game bid keeps East quiet.

Lead $\vee 5$ (fourth highest stronger major)
West's excellent intermediates mean he can accept the invitation. The successful diamond finesse is enough for game.

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
