South has a decent hand but no reason to bid. A 6-1 fit is fine for a 2-level contract. Neither East nor West really has a bid. There are 9 tricks available or perhaps 8 if the defenders manage to get a heart ruff.

East is a little too strong for a 'weak 2'. The hand is *just* worth a $1 \vee$ opening bid. If East did open $2 \vee$, the heart game might be missed. In $4 \vee$, declarer can ruff a spade or set up the diamond suit.

South is good enough to enquire with $2 N T$ despite the singleton heart. North's $\mathbf{3}$ \& shows upper range and a feature in diamonds, so South bids game in NT or hearts. In 3NT, overtake the heart Jack and continue the suit.

Opposite a weak 2, West is just worth a game try. However East simply repeats the suit and 3 A becomes the contract. It's a decent contract, but may well go down.

West's $2 N T$ is a natural bid, showing around 17-20 points. East could use Stayman or transfers with a suitable hand, but $3 N T$ is best here. Take the diamond finesse and $3 N T$ is easy.


North has a decent hand for a take-out double. East bids a preemptive $4 \vee$ and South bids the spade game. Will East take on a sacrifice in hearts? Time will tell.
