X - Penalty Double. Spade honours are likely to be held by South so we should expect to take 3 or 4 trump tricks. With no fit in clubs, ruffs are also likely. Our two aces will put the contract at least one down. In addition, partner's club length and our $\diamond$ Q might be good for additional tricks.

(1) The single-major raise is admissible with just three-card support and 6-9 HCP
(2) Inviting game in hearts
(3) Accepting with a maximum HCP count
(4) The bidding reveals that the opponents have little to spare, the bad trump split, (you have two certain tricks) should defeat their game.


## Plan the play to defeat this contract

Opening lead: $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} \mathbf{T}$, Top of a sequence

- East wins the Ace and switches to the Queen of Clubs. (lead through dummy's weakness)
- Declarer plays his King of Clubs but West wins the Ace and leads a second Club to Dummy's ten and East's Jack.
- East leads the 9 Clubs, ruffed low by Declarer and over-ruffed by West.
- Declarer cannot avoid losing a second trump trick to West.
- Contract down two (doubled, vulnerable) - 500 points to East/West
