Lead DJ. After winning 2 diamond tricks, East is likely to switch to a small heart - lead up to weakness. Depending on how they play the hearts, NS may lose 1 heart trick, and also 2 club tricks, but the contract should make.

Assuming contract is 1NT by West, North should lead C6 (4n best). On 4n club, South should play S9 (high encourages). Defence should get SK and also DK and now the contract is likely to be 2 off. If E cleverly plays SA, on first round of spades, North will have no spade left to return and contract would only be 1 off.

Lead HK. Trump third heart and play CA, CK and a third club, ruffing in dummy. Declarer should make 5 club tricks and 3 spade tricks.

Lead S3. Declarer must finesse in 2 suits, i.e. play towards the DQ and towards the HK, to ensure 2 spade tricks, 2 club tricks, 1 heart and 3 diamonds.

Lead C3 - not ideal, but diamond and spade leads are unattractive as one should neither lead away from an Ace nor lead an unsupported Ace against a suit contract. Contract will make easily. In this case if East does lead SA and gets an encouraging card from partner defence will take 3 tricks.

Some students may be playing weak twos in which case West will open the bidding, with 2 S, but NS should still reach 4 H .

Lead C4, 4" best. Declarer should play on diamonds to establish 3 tricks along with 3 spade tricks, to go with a club trick. Best play would be for South to play C10 on first trick and then switch to a heart. North may overcall 2C.

Lead DA. Declarer wins any continuation and after taking 2 club winners and the top spade, cross ruffs the hand for 11 tricks.

Lead D2 - low from an honour. Note: not usually a good idea to lead your longest suit when it has been bid by opponents. Declarer should take 3 spade tricks (aiming to finesse SJ, but the SQ drops), 3 heart tricks and 2 diamonds.
South should not open 1H with only 11 points and no sensible rebid.

Lead JC．South should take 11 tricks，losing only 1 spade and 1 heart．After drawing trump，playing the Ace first and then low towards Queen，he returns to hand to take diamond finesse．If $D Q$ is not covered，he should play low from dummy．

Lead C5（4＊best unless QJ10，or QJ9）．Play on spades．If in doubt about which suit to play first，choose the suit where you must lose a trick．You may not lose a diamond trick as Queen might drop or finesse might work． Declarer should take 3 spade tricks， 2 hearts， and 1 club．The number of diamond tricks depends on how they are played．Declarer could go down but could also make 11 tricks．

Lead C7. From the rule of 11, West knows that South has no card higher than the 7 , so can safely let the lead come round to his own hand. Play on spades. Declarer should win $2 / 3$ spades, 3 clubs 1 diamond and 1 heart.

Lead S3 (MUD lead in unbid suit). Shouldn't lead 4" best when the suit has been bid on your right. This gives opponent a free finesse. East has very few entries, so it would be difficult to set up heart suit. I would win SA and finesse a heart, while I still have SK as an entry. When the finesse is successful we have control of all the suits and can now play on diamonds. We have 2 spades, 2 hearts, 1 club and 4 diamonds.

Lead D10. Top of honour sequence in unbid suit. With 2 suits, it is often better to lead the poorer in the hope of getting it established while you still have an entry. This contract should not make, as declarer does not have time to set up his club suit before EW gets diamonds established. Spade Ace acts as an entry for long diamonds.

Lead CK - top of honour sequence. Contract likely to go down as EW may lose a diamond, a heart and 2 clubs. The normal diamond play would be DA and finesse DJ, but if East plays to drop the DQ he does make the contract.
