## Improvers Bidding Challenge (23)

## April 2021

My thanks to all the panellists who support this feature without their contributions it would not be possible. The regulars are joined by a few newcomers this time

Most of the panel were in agreement here.
Edmond: Pass - don't like to open a $4=4=4=1$ with only 12 HCP - perhaps if the singleton was an Ace I might try 1NT.
CAMPBELL: Pass. A 4=4=4=1 hand doesn't play well, unless a fit is found. If you open $1 \diamond$ and partner responds $1 \Delta 2 \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}$ doesn't really describe the hand. You may well be able to bid at a later stage, but I prefer to pass initially.
Hamilton: Pass. If partner has Spades, I've no rebid. If the opponents have Spades, I can double for takeout.
To sum up: downgrading a 4=4=4=1 hand is a sound policy, especially when the singleton is an honour. You may get the chance to make a very descriptive take-out double later and you will avoid getting into trouble when the hand is a misfit.
Still, many of the Bronze players and two panellists could not resist bidding. There is much debate over what to open with 4=4=4=1 distribution. The most popular choice was:
Gallacher: 10 . Bid the suit below the singleton, and if partner bids 1s we have an easy rebid of 2\&. Partner might play us for 5-4 distribution.
Indeed, partner probably will assume that you have 5 hearts if you rebid two of a minor.
McLEOD:1 $\wedge$. I'm torn between this and passing, all because of the rebid issue. 1e is the worst possible bid, because when partner replies 1s (likely), you are forced to lie about both your shape and points! Similarly, when you open 10 and get a 1a response, you can't avoid pretending you have a 5+ card heart suit, or a balanced 15-17 - neither of which you want to lie about. I think this is just too good to Pass, so I'll open $1 \diamond$ and prepare to rebid 2 if I must. Certainly, at Bronze level, most players will open here, so choosing the best of the opening bids will put you ahead of the field.
Best advice: consider what you will rebid when partner responds in your shortage; if nothing appeals, pass the noo'!

Partner held K8652 9864 Q63 3. Opening 10 gets you too high, 1 m gets a bad lead to let 3 N home. If you pass opponents probably play in 1NT, but at least you have kept out of trouble.

The entire panel chooses to raise hearts (they assume that partner is not 1=4=4=4!) Most thought the hand worth a raise to game.
Frame: 40: We have at least an 8-card heart fit and, despite only having 11 HCP , have a 7 -loser hand.
Indeed, the point count is not a good yardstick once you have found a major suit fit: controls and distribution are more important. Some panellists thought the hand too strong for a simple raise to game.
MALE: (Similarly Tudor and McLeod) 2». A nice hand, three-card fit for partner's hearts, Ace of partner's second suit, singleton diamond, and a good 6 -card spade suit. $4 \varnothing$ looks a safe bet, but could partner have a $15 / 16$ count? I think I need a little more information, so will use Fourth Suit Forcing.

Others were less sanguine:
Gallacher: 30 . Partner's bidding shows an unbalanced hand otherwise she would bid no-trump at some level. I have 3 cards in both partner's suits and ruffing values with the singleton diamond. I can't quite decide if we have enough for game so I invite with a delayed jump raise.
Several Improvers preferred to rebid their nice spade suit rather than raise partner on xxx. But 2^ is a sign off, and 3a may be passed if partner has a singleton. Useful advice is "Whenever raising partner is an option, choose that."

Partner held 4 AKJ86 KQ4 T973. $4 \bigcirc$ was makeable in spite of a 4-1 break: 4. was hopeless with 2 spade losers.

The panel mostly think we are worth another go. The majority rebid 2NT, more or less enthusiastically.
SANDERS: 2NT. 19-21 with a spade guard. Easy now for partner to take appropriate action.

MALE: 2NT. This is tough. West has a pretty good hand to be able to repeat their spades, partner hasn't much, I don't like 2NT, but I don't like double again, partner might pass and we have doubled them into game. Passing seems wimpy, so 2NT it is.

Others thought their spade stopper was inadequate:

Hamilton: (supported by McLeod) Dbl, though I'll have more problems on the next round. If partner has the $\diamond A$ I want to be in 3NT, if he doesn't 2NT might be too high. I'm going to guess he doesn't have it. and not trust my single Spade stop.

Frame: (Similarly TUDOR) $3 \diamond$. Shows a very strong, 2-suited hand with five diamonds but without heart support. I shall pass if partner rebids 30 but am hopeful of him bidding game (3NT or $4 \vee$ ) if he is suitable.
Gallacher: Pass. My double forces partner to bid and she has by-passed clubs and diamonds and replied with a minimum 20 . West has, presumably, 6 spades and I would guess the $\diamond A$ for his bid. With 20 points and West's 13 say, it does not leave much for partner. Also if I double and he makes his contract it gives him a vulnerable game. This problem has given me heartburn and at the table I would pass.

Partner held T82 9874326 753, so Mike's was the winning action. If you make another call it would be best to respect partner's sign off in 30 .

When partner doubles $1 \diamond$ he should either have a very strong hand or support for both Majors, but he does not guarantee clubs as well. So four panellists choose to bid their Major before the longer clubs.
Campbell: 10. Prefer not to miss a 4-card Major fit and unless forced, you really only have one bid. If partner bids 14, you can then bid 2\&.
Edmond: 18 - I always bid a major if I can and here I can bid 2e later if forced to

It would be normal to bid 1 H with 4 hearts and 5 clubs, but some are swayed by the sixth club and the poor heart quality.
McLEOD: 2e. The sort of hand that makes me wish I hadn't signed up for this! Right, if you have an agreement with partner that a 2-level response to their $X$ shows 10+ points, I think you have to close your eyes, bid 10 , and hope for the best. But if partner knows that any non-jump response from you could be weak because you are forced to bid, clubs is your likeliest fit, so you may as well bid those. Even when
you have a 4=4 heart fit, you're odds on to have a 6=3+ club fit (if you can trust partner's double, which you should).

## Our outlier is characteristically optimistic:

SANDERS: 3\& . Despite only 6 points this hand has great shape and it looks like the opponents have an 8-card spade fit. So we can give ourselves two bites at the cherry, preempt the auction and should partner take further action with a $3 \diamond$ cue bid have a 30 rebid to fall back on

Jim also considers 3* but finds it a bit rich.
TuDOR: 2\& I hope I have the opportunity to show my heart suit on the next round. If I jump to $3 \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}$ initially I think partner will expect more in the way of high cards.

Partner held AKT542 A8 J5 AK3. He will rebid 2^ over either minimum response, but might be tempted to try 3NT over 3^. Which will be fine unless they lead diamonds.
