## Improvers' Bidding Challenge

## 17 - October 2019

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We have input from a panel of 9 bridge teachers for our latest challenge. The questions for Challenge 18 appear elsewhere in this magazine and will also be posted on the SBU website - if you are a Bronze category player, please have a go and submit an entry. Let's see what our panel of teachers has to say:

Problem 1 Teams All Vul

The majority of the panel decided to bid game:

Hamilton (similarly Benson, Gallacher, Pigott \& Tudor): 4 $\mathbf{~}$ : Doesn't need much so going for it at Teams - 3NT is likely to have problems in Spades as partner will be short as well.

Peter, Liz and Derek judged that inviting game was sufficient:

Edmond (similarly McGowan \& Sanders):
3४: 3C shows 9 of my cards but would be forcing so here I prefer to leave it up to partner.

Steve decided to force and bid out his shape:
Male: 3e: Great hand - this is game forcing as I need very little from partner to make 5 H or several tricks in Clubs.

At the table, partner held $\uparrow K J 2, ~ T 9, ~ 942$, \& 49742 so, with only 3 losers, game was easily made.

The panel was split between a 1-level opener and a strong pre-empt:

Pigott (similarly Benson, Male, McGowan, Sanders \& Tudor): 1 $\boldsymbol{\vee}$ : Because of my two aces, 3 H is unthinkable but, although 4 H is also pre-emptive, I want to hear more from partner before deciding on the final level especially as my hand has so much potential if a fit is found.

Mike, Peter \& Danny preferred to jump straight to game:

Gallacher (similarly Edmond \& Hamilton): 4 $\mathbf{\downarrow}$ : The dilemma is what level of Hearts to open - I could open 1 but, at favourable vulnerability and the dealer, I bid game immediately to make it difficult for the opposition to find the correct contract.

Partner's hand was $\boldsymbol{\wedge}$ K8752, $\uparrow$ Q97, $\uparrow$, \&AT4 so 11 tricks were available with $K$ onside.

Problem 3 Teams NS Vul

The panel was split on whether to invite or not - the majority introduced their second suit...

McGowan (similarly others): 2e: Partner should give preference to Spades if he is 2-3 - if he has a singleton spade we may reach the best contract this way.
...but Joyce and Mike wanted to tell partner about their $6^{\text {th }}$ Spade:

Benson (similarly Gallacher): 2d: The choice here is between $2 \mathrm{~S} \& 2 \mathrm{C}$ but I reckon that the Club suit is so poor that this describes the hand better.

Partner held QT, MK92, J8753, QT6 so, with a fortunate lie of the opponents' cards, careful play led to 10 or even 11 tricks!

The majority of the panel opted to risk the NT game with various degrees of confidence:

Sanders (similarly Hamilton, McGowan \& Pigott): 3N: Partner has a spade shortage so likely to have stuff in the other suits!

Tudor (similarly Edmond): 3N: A little risky but this semi-gambling action often pays off - if opponents double, I might have a rethink!

Steve \& Mike opted for a conservative line:
Male (similarly Gallacher): Pass: No need to bid for now - partner couldn`t double but, if they bid 3S I'll go to 4D.

Joyce decided to leave it to partner to decide if there were 11 tricks in their minor:

Benson: 4४: This time it is close between 4D \& pass but this gives partner a chance to bid 5D or pass depending on the outside quality of their hand.
